



Founded upon an American-Ugandan collaboration to provide basic medical care to a village of 3500 suffering from such preventable diseases as malaria, tuberculosis, and malnutrition, the Engeye medical clinic in the rural village of Ddegeya was born. A modest structure built for 12 treated more than 1000 villagers during the first medical mission in April 2007. For many, the 20-mile journey by foot was nothing compared to the 500-mile trek to the nearest hospital. Today, Engeye is on its way towards achieving its independence from foreign aid with 3 permanently staffed local Ugandan nurses who treat more than 24 patients daily. With each new day, the on-going collaboration between the communities in the U.S. and Uganda develop the capacity for self-sufficiency through fundraising efforts and the generosity of donations.



Fundraising goals for 2008 include:

- a generator to provide a reliable source of electricity to perform minor surgeries
- building materials to complete the construction of the laboratory
- laboratory equipment for malaria and tuberculosis testing
- basic medical supplies and medicine
